Lester H. Davis Town Meeting House Tour

Spotlight on History: Lester H. Davis Town Meeting House

Situated along Middle Country Road in Coram, the Lester H. Davis Town Meeting House is one of the oldest original buildings in the Longwood community. Built by Elijah Davis around 1750, the house is representative of the English, Dutch, and New England styles of architecture found on the eastern end of Long Island and has played a vital role in the history of the local community and the Town of Brookhaven. In addition to being a working farm, the Davis House was a tavern, general store, base for a horse artillery company of the State Militia, and most importantly, the seat of the Town of Brookhaven. Since it was in the middle of the island, all Town meetings and the Town's official boards were held there from 1790 to 1884. Men came to vote in the annual election held on the first Tuesday in April. These meetings were a combination of political, social, and business events. Horses were traded, relatives and friends socialized, and baker wagons, oyster stands, farm equipment salesmen, and other merchants sold their wares along Middle Country Road. During the Civil War, special Town meetings were held in Coram to decide how many men would be sent to fight and how much they would be paid. After 1884, the town population grew too large to hold a centralized town meeting, and it was decided to divide the town into election districts; however, the Davis family and their house still played a significant role in the Town government. They served as Town Board members, Town Clerks, Justices of the Peace, and even Suffolk County Treasurer.

The farm, which over the years ranged in size from 200 to 135 acres, grew a variety of grains such as barley, wheat, rye, buckwheat, and corn. Cows, hogs, sheep, and chickens were raised for family use and sale. Later, new crops such as asparagus, potatoes, peaches, pears, plums, and assorted berries were added. As with much of the community, cordwood remained an important business for the Davises, with the wood shipped off on sloops and later freight cars. The last owner of the house, Lester H. Davis III, kept a herd of 135 cows for his dairy farm. The cows and barns were on the north side of Middle Country Road, but their pastures were south of the road. As a result, they were brought across Middle Country Road daily to graze in the fields. Lester transformed a portion of his farmland into an airfield in 1959. Known as the Coram Airport, it closed in 1984 but has been occasionally used for emergency landings and is still visible in satellite images of the area.

By the 1960s, Coram was being built up, with new housing developments popping up on the tracts of old farmland. Traffic increased, and the cows needed police officers to stop traffic to let them pass. By 1974, the dairy business ceased. Eventually, most of the farm south of Middle Country Road was sold and became a shopping center. In 1997, Lester sold the house and 3/4 acres of land to the Town of Brookhaven for \$300,000 and zoning concessions on other land he owned. The Town later bought the plot of land on which the Davis family cemetery is located. The house is listed on the State and National Registers of Historic Places and is designated as a Brookhaven Town Landmark.

Annual Message to the Community

In 2024, as usual, we had a lot going on here at the LPL. The Community Yarn Project was a "thread" that ran through the entire year and across all departments, from collecting donated yarn to offering programs for all ages, to displaying fiber arts around our building and finally to donating lap blankets to a local rehab facility. Thanks to all who took part in this library-wide, and community-wide, initiative.

Our staff introduced new programming such as the volunteer-led Repair Café and the eclipse challenge (we distributed 1300 sets of glasses to participants!). We expanded programs in the makerLAB. We added new discount tickets for sale at the Circulation Desk, saving residents money. Thanks to Legislator Caracappa, we were awarded a grant from Suffolk County which supported

additional summer music and dance performances. We launched a new platform for mobile printing in the library, and introduced Fiero Code, a new online resource for learning coding skills. Our community completed the second iteration of the NexTrex Challenge, taking soft plastic film out of the waste stream, and winning a bench that is now located in Bartlett Pond Park. As always, we continue to enhance our collections: we added lots of new items to our Equipment & Gadgets collection, and our children's department introduced Toniebox Kits.

Our dedicated library staff has worked throughout the year to offer high-quality, in-demand services, and has made plans to introduce new programs and services in 2025.

Now that we have been in our "new" building for almost ten years, we will also be evaluating our collections and their use as well as their placement in the building. We anticipate relocating some items and freshening up spaces.

The Board of Trustees is pleased to announce that the small proposed increase is again below the state tax cap. The anticipated increase for the average household is 94 cents per month (\$11.29 per year). Details of the proposed budget are shown here and will be available in the library and online in early March. The Board will hold a budget information meeting on Wednesday, March 26 at 7:00 pm.

Completed petitions for library trustee are due by 5:00 pm on Monday, March 10, and information about trustee candidates will be available in the library and on our website shortly thereafter. There is one five-year term seat on the Board of Trustees that is up for election.

A Few Statistics from 2024

- More than 489,000 physical items were checked out or renewed. In addition, eBooks, movies, music and audiobooks were streamed or downloaded more than 187,000 times.
- Computers were used almost 35,000 times, and the library's wireless network was accessed more than 113,000 times.
- Library staff planned and produced 2117 in-person or virtual programs with 39,645 participants.
- Cardholders utilized our online learning courses more than 21,000 times.
- The library's convenient mobile app was launched almost 37,000 times during the year.

The proposed operating budget for **2025-2026** is below the NYS tax cap. It is estimated that the adoption of this budget will raise the library's tax rate to \$17.10 per \$100 of assessed valuation. This would increase the average homeowner's tax payment by \$11.29 per year or 94ϕ per month.
